The trails around Mount Sanitas, just north of the city, offer two of the area's go-to hikes for visitors and locals alike. The Mt. Sanitas Ridge Trail ascends 1,300 feet as it traverses a set of rising peaks over 1.5 miles. The Valley Trail is much friendlier on the dog-walker (and the quads), a wide path rising steadily over a mile.

Mt. Sanitas was named after the Boulder-Colorado Sanitarium and Hospital, whose staff - including founder John Henry Kellogg - built the first mountain trail in 1902 as a healthful exercise option for the center's tuberculosis patients. The Valley Trail later served as a wagon road for workers hauling sandstone from the region to be used in the construction of the University of Colorado's first buildings.

Sos is a nine-month-old, 60 lb. German Shorthaired Pointer. He is an athletic hunting dog who loves the water, working, running in open spaces, chasing bumpers, meeting new people, swimming, and chasing birds.

The Eagle Trail is a multi-use trail that runs through the Boulder Valley Ranch due west of the Boulder Reservoir. In the appropriate season, hikers can expect to see wildflowers speckling the meadow as they hike out toward Mesa Reservoir. They may also be graced with glimpses of eagles, northern harriers, and red-tailed hawks in the sky, and - at ground level - mule deer, coyotes and rattlesnakes.














Buster aka Buster Bluth, Buddy, Butter busts out the tennis balls at CU South

Chance aka Chancenator


shines at the Sunrise Amphitheater


Jiggs aka Jiggy, Bomb, Monkey

Chautauqua Trail runs through a meadow that rises majestically toward the Flatiron Mountains, the city's most iconic and breathtaking setting. The park is the crown jewel in the city's Open Space and Mountain Parks program, an extensive trail system that veins the foothills for miles in all directions, with spurs that rise to the spectacular formations of Devil's Thumb and Royal Arch. The Flatirons themselves - three triangular peaked sandstone slabs - are a destination for hikers, a challenge for climbers, and a sight to thrill the eye.

Zebulon Pike and Stephan Long, after whom some of the Rockies' largest peaks were later named, were among the group of explorers commissioned to explore the Boulder area in the mid-1800s. Their men made camp in an area at the cusp of the plains and the foothills known today as Settler's Park. The dramatic upthrusting rocks of the area are part of the same formation that rises to the short peak of Mount Sanitas to the north and that caused the well-known Red Rocks amphitheater miles to the south. The trailhead is just a short stroll from downtown Boulder, and from there it's just a half-mile scamper to the crest, where visitors can clamber over the sandstone rocks and gaze out over the gorgeous Sanitas Valley.

The Lobo Trail, named for its terminus cities, is a 12-mile regional system of trails on county Open Space connecting Boulder to the city of Longmont. Hugging the nearby Diagonal Highway in its northern segment, the trail winds through plain and pasture as it passes through the town of Niwot, skirting the scenic Twin Lakes recreation area in the Gunbarrel neighborhood before ending at the Cottonwood Trail. There are many dogs to be found along its length, but most tend to be of the prairie dog variety.








Willow aka Wee Weez, Nutter takes the stage at the Glen Huntington Bandshell


The Bandshell in Boulder's downtown City Park has hosted cultural and civic events since 1938. It was designed by local architect Glen Huntington, who was also responsible for the nearby County Courthouse, and anchors a sloping greensward along the Boulder Creek designed by civic planner and landscape architect Saco DeBoer. Today, the Bandshell is a source of passionate historical pride for many longtime residents, who have continually resisted efforts to raze or relocate it in the face of various redevelopment plans.

The Lake (also called a Pond, in some quarters) was formed by the erection of a dam in 1888.
